College Admission Experience is about researching and opening minds to new ideas

- There are over 4600 colleges in the US, including 2-year, trade schools, etc.

Being realistic about college affordability

Public In State – partially funded by gov't which results in cheaper sticker price for in state students. However, usually large pool of applicants so tougher to earn any type of scholarship.

Public Out of State – typically not great financial fits, less chance of any meaningful scholarship.

Public two year colleges – community, some have dorms, if go and plan to transfer try to get in Phi Beta Kappa (an academic honor society) better chance for scholarship money when transfer.

Private Schools – more likely to be flexible with scholarships. Sometimes can meet or better cost of in state school.

Scholarships make out of state schools more affordable.

- Based on Academic achievement, Test Scores, Leadership, Service
 - Many require nominations
 - Should look at profiles of past winners for the attributes that lead to these scholarships
 - Many include interviews
 - Examples:
 - UNC Chapel Hill Morehead Cain Scholarship
 - UNC Chapel Hill & Duke Robinson Scholarship
 - North Carolina State Park Scholarship
 - University of Virginia Jefferson Scholarship
 - UNC Charlotte Levine Scholarship


Other Ways to make Financial Fit


Many also offer partial or full-ride scholarships to the highest achievers.


The best college searches are the ones that help students discover themselves along the way!







- Talk to students other than tour guide
- Make sure look at dorms, cafeteria, gym, etc.
- Research town
- Look at bulletin boards
- Pick up college newspaper or journal

- Schedule tour
- Schedule time to talk to admissions rep if possible



- Planned agendas and led weekly meetings of approx.
 20 club members

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After you choose your colleges, visit, interview and narrow your list...

TIME TODECIDE HOW YOU WILL APPLY

- **1. Early Decision** This is **BINDING** and you can only apply to one school ED. If you get in you have to immediately withdraw all other applications and plan to attend.
- 2. **Early Action** This is non-binding. You can apply to several colleges Early Action. You apply early and get a decision early but do not have to confirm till May 1st.
- 3. **Restrictive Early Action** Non-binding but not suppose to apply to any other schools EA, ED.
- 4. **Regular Decision** Non-Binding, can apply to other schools you want any way you want.
- 5. **Rolling Admissions** The college will review applications as they become complete. Hint: Apply early because once the spots are full, they're full!



Early Decision Guidelines

- Should Consider if:
 - You have visited & have very good knowledge of a number of colleges
 - Have narrowed choices to one-if admitted will attend
 - Your cumulative GPA & SAT/ACT scores are competitive for college
 - Course work meets rigor suggested
 - You can afford college

- Reconsider if
- You are counting on October SAT
- You suspect your record is not yet good enough
- If you feel like you are just now going to step up academically
- Or if you're really not sure where you want to go.



College Applications

Good News

- Online applications are the norm
- Colleges accept 2/3 of freshman applications.
- There are almost 4000 colleges in the US

Bad News

• Restrictive **Colleges** are named that for a reason

What application platform should I use? Common Application

Common Application-Over 1000 institutions

Pros

Common App completely free to use. (Colleges have application fees but platform free.) Sends out system alerts when deadlines are approaching to keep you on track.

Keeps a requirement tracker for each application (including essays and when to submit your FAFSA)

Allows you to self-report test scores

BUT STILL HAVE TO SEND OFFICIAL TO MOST SCHOOLS

- Comes as a mobile app, which can keep task lists and give you alerts.
- Provides a virtual Counselor
- Offers services in Spanish
- Been around since 1975, significant experience.
- CONS
- Because of multiple applications, colleges relying more on demonstrated interest.

Common Application

Common App was designed to simplify the application process



There is also other applications

Common Black College Application - \$20 dollar fee to apply to all 68 college members. Need to visit the college websites individually to see what essay requirement or recommendations needed.

University of California (UC) Schools have own application

There are other schools such as Georgetown, University of Chicago and some others who have own application and requirements.



Recommendations and Essays

- Your student needs to ask 2 Academic teachers if they could please write them a POSITIVE recommendation. No later than Sept. 15th
- Follow up with Teacher recommendation packet.
- They should NOT Forget to do their School Counselors Packet as soon as they can but do a good job! Should get it done sooner rather than later

The personal essay statement

Common Application's personal essay is 650 words

Other applications have different word counts

How do you start

- One way:
 - Each week set a day aside and sit for 30 to 60 minutes and just start writing.
 - If you do not get anywhere stop till the next week and try again.
 - If you do get going keep going with it. Then take a break for a couple of days and come back and see if still like it or want to go a different way etc.
 - OR attend a college essay camp

College Planner

- #1 Rule to remember- <u>Colleges are businesses</u> and very big businesses at that.
 - In 2011 Dartmouth's budget was over 850 million dollars
 - Houston Community College was just shy of 300 million dollars.

According to College Board average cost of tuition, fees, and room and board at private, non-profit, four year college is \$48,510. Cost of attendance at some is over \$70,000 a year.



What are college Co-Op Programs?

Co-ops – or cooperative educational experiences – offer students the chance of payment and academic credit for an actual job experience during their undergraduate career.

According to The College Affordability Guide, 56.8% of employers made full-time offers to their co-op students.

• Even if your co-op company doesn't hire your cohort pool, your practical work experience make you appealing to other employers

Difference between Co-op and Internships

- One major difference between internship and co-op is that co-ops tend to be full-time positions that take place over course of semester.
- Internships are generally fewer hours and considered part-time positions.
- Schools more thoroughly vet experiences for co-op, they don't want you filling co-workers coffee orders.

- There are 3 standard models of co-op
- Alternating semesteralternate one sems. Academic and next sems. Full-time co-op
- 2. Part-time program you work at co-op like any other part time job
- 3. One semester program this one requires you to complete just one semester of a co-op program.

Most universities plan for you to finish degree and co-op in four years a few allow for five to finish it.

Does Income from Co-ops Impact **Financial** Aid?

Most schools, your co-op wages don't count toward your Expected Family Income (next year the EFC will be called the SAI, Student Aid Index). This means you won't have to worry about paying more.

Co-op earnings are considered regular earned income for tax purposes and are reported as earned income on the FAFSA (for the prior-prior year it was earned).

However, question 44f on the FAFSA asks about co-op earnings.

In the student income section of the SAI worksheet, co-op earnings are subtracted from total student income.




