I have recently received our MCAP scores, and I will be sharing more information in the next newsletter and during a PTA meeting. Until that time, please know that we made some growth, so we are on the right track, and we need to keep that trajectory. One of the biggest barriers to our students' progress is poor attendance. As a school, 71% of our students had a 90% or better attendance rate. That is growth from 67% for 2021-2022, however, the state standard is 90%. We have a long way to go, and we need your help! School has changed to be much more interactive, students who miss real time with their teachers and classmates miss out on the complexities of the learning. Please establish great home-habits for bed time, homework, and a consistent morning routine to give your child the best start possible.

NO MEDICATION OF ANY KIND, PRESCRIPTION OR NON-PRESCRIPTION, CAN BE ADMINISTERED BY THE SCHOOL STAFF UNLESS YOUR DOCTOR HAS FILLED OUT THE MEDICATION FORM ISSUED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION. Birthdays at Lothian

We love to celebrate birthdays at Lothian. We don't allow food or snacks for birthdays, but welcome small fun gifts, like pencils or stickers. Parents can send a class set of party invitations or children may distribute party invitations themselves.

Backpacks

Students may use backpacks to carry books and supplies to and from school. Backpacks are kept in the student's locker during the day, so they must be the appropriate size (NOT TOO LARGE) to fit in the locker. The decision to keep backpacks in lockers is a health and safety issue. The backpacks block aisles in the classroom and restrict ease in passing in the halls. Also, the backpacks are often too large and heavy to carry all day for the majority of physically developing students. NO BACKPACKS WITH WHEELS PLEASE! Students will have multiple opportunities each day to visit their lockers.

Camera

Lothian Elementary School is equipped with a video camera system. It covers selected interior and exterior public portions of the building and grounds. It is NOT monitored constantly, but it is monitored during emergency situations. During certain events, when the safety or security of students may be in question, authorized personnel from local, state, or federal police or fire emergency units may be given access to view images projected on the camera system. Emergency Drills

During each school year, various drills are conducted at every school to ensure that staff and students are prepared in the event of an emergency. These drills include monthly fire/evacuation drills.

In addition drills with scenarios developed by the school system's Office of School Security and based upon various possible emergency scenarios are done each year. These include, but are not limited to: evacuation for natural gas emergencies; shelter for tornado and earthquake; shelter for outside hazardous materials release; lockout for danger outside of the school building, reverse evacuation back into the school for students and staff outside; and lockdown for a person with a weapon inside of the school. These drills are discussed with staff prior to the drill, evaluated once the drill is complete. In some cases, the drills may be discussed with students before they take place.

Free Breakfast Program

Lothian Elementary has qualified for a grant offering free breakfast to all students, regardless of income level. Please be aware that this option is available to your child(ren) again this school year.

Free/Reduced Lunch Applications

ECIA Title 1 is a Federally funded program designed to help students needing extra assistance in reading and mathematics. It provides additional assistance in the areas of personnel, resources, materials of instruction, staff development and parent involvement. The National Lunch Program/School Breakfast Program is used to determine Title 1 eligible schools.

If you believe that you might be eligible for the lunch/breakfast program, please complete the application and return it to school AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. Students who were eligible last year <u>MUST</u> submit a new application for approval this school year. If your child was receiving free or reduced lunch last year, this will carry over until October.

You can be assured that confidentiality will be observed. Counselor's Corner

The School Counseling Program at Lothian Elementary School:

As a professional school counselor, I deliver a comprehensive school counseling program aligned with the National Standards for School Counseling. The program includes classroom, group, and individual counseling processes that develop student competencies in the academic, career, and personal/social domains. The program is developed using data that support and link the counseling program to students' academic success. Services are delivered through classroom guidance, group, individual counseling and student planning, as well as consultation, collaboration, and coordination. It is driven by my mission that aligns with both the AACPS mission and our school mission. It is as follows:

"My mission is to promote and enhance student learning through academic, career, and personal/social development and provide support for all students so that they can maximize their student potential and feel safe, nurtured, and respected. My hope is that by advocating for students, providing them with skills they need, and working in a partnership with educators, parents, and the community, all students will have the knowledge and skills they need to be responsible citizens, creative thinkers, and life-long learners."

Classroom guidance is provided for all students (Pre-K - 5) across the educational, career, and personal/social domain. I am in every classroom every other week throughout the entire year. Please ask your child(ren) regularly what they have been learning in Guidance. You can also go to the Lothian Elementary School website and click on "Guidance Corner" to see strategies I teach to students to help them be successful in school.

Small group guidance and counseling is provided for some students throughout the year. Topics vary based on the needs of the students at the different grade levels.

I also provide school-related individual counseling and student planning. Students can self-refer, and parents, teachers, and administrators can request that I see students. The counseling is brief solution focused and does not constitute therapy. I have information available to parents seeking outside therapy for their child listing psychologists, social workers, and therapists in the area.

In addition to counseling, I provide consultation and coordination services. I work with the school staff and parents, as part of a team, to assist students so they can do their best in school. I also have resources on a variety of different topics that parents may find helpful.

5th grade parents:

It is already time to start thinking about Middle School options for your child. Magnet programs, part of Anne Arundel County's Programs of Choice, offer motivated students who reside in Anne Arundel County the opportunity to engage in a specialized course of study that differs from the traditional curriculum offered in AACPS. Eligible Magnet students will engage in rigorous and relevant learning experiences in subject areas in which they have a great interest. The 3 options for students that will be in 6th grade in the Fall of 2024 include the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) Program at Central Middle School, APEX Arts Program at Bates Middle School, and the IB (International Baccalaureate) program at Annapolis Middle School.

The application process for the Magnet Programs will open at noon on October 9, 2023 and will close at noon, November 13, 2023.

Buses/Student Drop Off



We encourage parents to have students ride the bus as often as possible!!! The fewer car-riders we have, the quicker, smoother and safer arrival and dismissal are for all students.

Cars dropping off/picking up students at <u>regular</u> arrival/dismissal times will need to pull in the <u>main</u> entrance (by the sign), follow the signs/lane markings to circle around and drop off/pick up students at the front entrance. Staff will be outside (until 7:55 am for drop-off) to greet students. Parents <u>should not park</u> and bring their children in due to traffic flow and parking concerns. Parents arriving after 7:55 or picking up early should park and enter the main entrance and report to the office to sign in/out their child. Please observe the BUSES ONLY signage for our bus loop.

Lothian Car Rider Afternoon Pick-Up Directions

We have two lines for Car Rider pick-up in the afternoon:

- Parents of students in Grades 1-5 should stay in the car line to the right (marked in blue). Students in Grades 1-5 will load before your car reaches the crosswalk. Our goal is for these students to independently get in the car and get their seatbelt on themselves. After loading your student(s), please follow staff directions when to cross and pass the parked red line parents.
- Parents of students in ECI, Pre-Kindergarten, and Kindergarten should stay in the car line to the left (marked in red). ECI, PK, and K students will load after you cross over the crosswalk (at staff direction) and your car is against the curb. It is understood that students in this line will probably need help from parents to get buckled in, so the red line gives extra time for that (but, please do this as quickly as possible to avoid delaying the line). Please wait until all cars in the red line are ready and then staff will direct you to

exit as a group. Older siblings of ECI, PK, and K students are welcome to load with their

younger siblings who need extra time in the red line.

In the morning, we just have one line. Please wait in line until you reach the curb in front of

the school entrance. Please follow staff direction to move forward, so that we can let multiple

students out of cars at the same time. Do not attempt to enter or exit the line and pass cars


unless by staff direction.

When leaving the parking lot, only right turns are allowed. If you need to go south, please

go right and go around the traffic circle to be able to come back in a southerly direction.

Please follow directions of staff members at all times (when in doubt, wait for us to signal

you). Most importantly, we want to make sure students, parents, and staff are safe. Thank you
