## Upcoming 5<sup>th</sup> grade parents for the 2024-2025 School Year (Current 4<sup>th</sup> graders):

It is not too early to start thinking about Middle School options for your child. Magnet programs, part of Anne Arundel County's Programs of Choice, offer motivated students who reside in Anne Arundel County the opportunity to engage in a specialized course of study that differs from the traditional curriculum offered in AACPS. Eligible Magnet students will engage in rigorous and relevant learning experiences in subject areas in which they have a great interest. The 3 options for those students that will be in 6<sup>th</sup> grade in the Fall of 2025 include the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) program at Central Middle School, APEX Arts at Bates Middle School, and the IB (International Baccalaureate) program at Annapolis Middle School.

### Grief and Loss

Grief happens in response to the loss of something or someone. Most of the time when we think of grief and loss, we think of the hurt that follows the death of a loved-one or a pet. Such losses are especially tough on children, but they can also grieve because of divorce, having to move from a favorite school, or losing a best friend who moves away. Children who grieve can encounter problems with sleeping, eating, headaches, crying spells, bed-wetting, immature behaviors, lack of energy, separation anxiety, and behavior and academic issues at school.

When helping children cope with a death, parents need to be conscious of each child's age. Infants and toddlers have almost no concept of death. Preschoolers often think death is reversible. Elementary - aged children start to comprehend the finality of death. Students in middle school understand death and they may act-out to cope with death. High school students may fully grasp the concept of death and seek out friends and family for support in dealing with the loss.

Here are some things that parents can do to help children cope with a death:

\*Acknowledge their feelings. Let them know that it is normal to cry and feel sad.
\*Empathize. Say, "I know it hurts." Share your feelings with the child.
\*Respect the child's coping strategies. Some children will want to talk about their feelings while others desire to keep it to themselves.

\*Use honest, concrete statements. Say, "Grandma died today". Don't use confusing terms such as,

"She passed away. She is sleeping, or she was taken from us."
\*Some children will be curious and ask questions about death and funerals. Answer them as honestly as possible.

Encourage children to start a journal to record feelings and to write about good memories of the\* deceased or express themselves through artwork, a collage, or poetry.

\*Some children fear that they will die soon. Reassure them that they are safe.

\*Keep children active in sports, clubs, church, hobbies, and interests. This helps to redirect some of the focus away from the recent traumatic event.

\* Parents need to use their best judgment when deciding if their children are old enough to attend funerals. Many experts believe that children need to attend if they wish. By not allowing children to attend it could create an environment of denial that does not allow them to actively participate in the grieving process.

\*Create ways to pay tribute to the deceased. Burn a candle every year on the deceased person's birthday. Visit the grave site if the child wishes. Purchase a Christmas tree ornament in memory of the person and let the child hang it on the tree every year.

\*Provide children with a list of persons they can talk to (besides their parents) that they can Talk to about the death such as a pastor, counselor, coach, or teacher.

### **Developing Writing and Spelling at Home**

Writing is a terrific way for children to express their thoughts, creativity, and uniqueness. It is also a fundamental way in which children learn to organize ideas. And learning to write well helps children to be better readers. When engaging in writing, young children often mirror what they see around them — adults and older children writing lists, notes, text messaging. They are observing the way writing is used in our everyday lives.

### Writing at home

Here are some suggestions that engage your child in the writing process:

- · Have your child write instructions for taking care of the family pet. These will be useful as you plan summer vacations!
- · Write a letter or thank you note to a relative. Talk through what your child wants to say before writing begins.
- Make a shopping list before going to the grocery store.
- Write an online review of a book or an item you recently purchased (www.amazon.com) or a recipe you tried (www.allrecipes.com).
- Talk about the presidential election and write a description of the kind of president you want.
- Find a picture in the newspaper and write an article to accompany it.
- Start keeping a personal diary, a household guestbook, or a baby book for a younger sibling.

### Does spelling count?

Early attempts at spelling are not the random swings they sometimes appear. Children's "invented spelling" gives us a window into what they understand about written language. A good teacher will be able to tell the difference between the misspellings that indicate normal literacy development and those that suggest a possible learning disability. If you have questions, talk to your child's teacher or reading specialist.

Writing tip: Stay positive! Kids who are worried about spelling every word correctly will often stick to a small group of words they can spell, or may avoid writing altogether.

### What should I write about?

Help your child get their thoughts together in an organized way. Especially when a child starts writing, he may need help planning out what he wants to say.

Writing tip: Get organized! Use sticky notes to help organize ideas. Put each idea or important word on a note, and lay the notes out on the table for easy rearranging. This helps with planning and organization.

#### Writer's strike

If your child avoids writing, use materials and tools that support both the thinking process and the physical act of writing:

- Use wide lined paper which helps kids line up and space their letters
- Use a whiteboard, which allows them to easily erase and try again
- Use a keyboard, which also allows kids to easily edit
