

Notes from the Office

<u>Early Dismissal / Change in Dismissal</u> -- All Early Dismissals or Change in Dismissal must be done prior to 2:00 PM

<u>Late Arrival</u> -- Any arrival after school begins at 8:00 AM, is considered Tardy. You must bring your student into office to sign them in.

Absences -- Absences can either be reported through the Parent Portal Account or a note can be sent in with the student when they return to school. Emails and phone calls are not accepted. Please note that reporting the absences does not automatically update the attendance and does not stop the AACPS generated attendance calls. Attendance is a manual process and is done throughout the day.

<u>Visitors Pass</u> -- All visitors must check in through the office. A Driver's License or State Issued ID is required. Military ID's cannot be scanned into the Visitor System.

<u>Chromebooks</u> -- ALL students in 3rd, 4th and 5th grades are expected to bring their chromebooks to and from school daly. While we do have loaners available, it is not a guarantee that we will always have enough loaners available.

As our school year gets underway, we want to remind families that regular attendance is an important priority. Research shows that it can have a significant effect on student success. Each month we will highlight some facts and tips to provide some interesting perspectives on this topic. If we can provide support with any attendance issues you are experiencing, please don't hesitate to reach out!

Did you know?

- Missing 10%, or about 2 days each month over the course of a school year, can make it harder to learn to read.
- Absences and tardiness can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.
- Children who were more frequently absent reported themselves as experiencing greater school-related stress, lower levels of motivation, and lower levels of school belonging.

Writing: Unit: Narrative Writing,



OCTOBER

OUR LEARNING



Reading: Students will continue to learn about elements of fiction stories by exploring characters, feelings, and mood. Students will continue to learn next steps for reading and responding to prompts. We will also be introducing non fiction text structures this month!

Math: This month we will be finishing exploring addition and subtraction strategies, and we will be beginning our unit on multiplication and division! Be on the look out for our parent letter coming home!

Writing: Students will be continuing their small moment unit this month, where they are writing true stories about small moments in their lives. We will be focusing on adding details, dialogue, and adding transitions to our stories. We will also be focusing on using capital letters and punctuation appropriately.

Science: Students will continue to learn about forces, specifically the effects of magnetic forces and how they can be used to solve problems.

Social Studies: We will be ending our geography unit this month! Then, students will focus on how people can change the environment through environmental modifications.

What's Happening in Fourth Grade?

Important Information:

Please visit Parent Portal (Powerschool) frequently to view/check your students grades.

If your student is absent please record the absence in Power School OR provide a written note upon your students return to school. Emails and phone calls can no longer be used as proof of student absence.

Instructional Focuses:

READING

Fiction Focus:

Students are working on identifying character traits based on how a character speaks and acts in a text. Students are also working on identifying the theme (lesson) of a text.

SCIENCE:

Students are learning about the structures of plants/animals and how plants and animals adapt to different environments.

SOCIAL STUDIES:

Students are learning about the geography of the Americas, Western Europe and West Africa. Then delving into 16th and 17th century migration patterns (why people left their home countries to come to the new world). As well as discovering the different indigenous nations living in the New World at that time.

WRITING:

Students are working towards writing a narrative writing piece with a realistic setting, strong/believable characters and a plot (beginning/middle/end).

MATH:

Students are working on adding and subtracting using the standard algorithm, estimating, and using multiplication in comparison situations.

WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

Math: Unit 4: Add and Subtract Decimals - Student will learn strategies to understand the placement of decimals when adding and subtracting i.e. tenths , hundredths, thousandths place.

ELA: Theme 1: Communication - compare and contrast stories in the same genre on their approaches to similar themes and topics, as well as integrate information from several texts on the same topic in order to write or speak about the subject knowledgeably.

Writing: Generating Personal Narratives - Use narrative techniques, such as dialogue, description, and pacing, to develop experiences and events or show the responses of characters to situations.

Science: Unit 3-5: Ecosystems and Food Webs - Students are choosing their own ecosystems to create a food web. Identifying producers consumers and decomposers within that ecosystem.

Social Studies: Exploring Maryland, the Constitution and Bill of Rights -Identifying how and why governmental power is distributed in Maryland.

The Cultural Arts Corner!

We are so excited to share what is happening in the cultural arts classrooms!

ART with Mrs. Long: We are working on our first autumn projects that will be hanging in the hallways once they are completed and graded. First grade is focusing on different ways to make lines. 2nd grade is learning how to create texture. 3rd grade has been creating multiple textures and will be showing how to arrange objects to create space. 4th grade is using tape to create shapes and painting with analogous colors. 5th grade is learning about Vincent van Gogh and are making a starry night pumpkin patch.

I'm also looking for parent volunteers that can help with hanging up artwork and completing a few tasks in the classroom like cutting paper, cleaning paint brushes, labeling artwork, etc.



What is the i-Ready Diagnostic?

The Diagnostic is an adaptive assessment that identifies students' strengths and opportunities for growth. That information helps determine how to best support their learning. Watch this <u>video</u> to learn more.



How can I access my student's results?

- 1. Log in to your student's *i-Ready* Dashboard using their district or school's portal credentials and then click on the *i-Ready* icon.
- 2. Click on the For Families dropdown and select the For Families report.
- 3. Enter your District's Report Code . PCBBZ4

How should I interpret my student's results?

How is my student doing overall?

The goal is for your student to achieve performance levels that meet or exceed the expectations set for their grade level.

On the For Families report, the A blue bar(s) on the graph and the corresponding B placement level(s) indicate how your student performed on each test in relation to their grade level, which is indicated by the B green shading. The D National Norm percentile below the graph indicates how your student performed in relation to students in the same grade level nationwide.

How is my student doing in specific learning areas?

It is important to understand how your student did in more specific

learning areas, which are called domains. The domain table shows how your student did in specific domains and helps teachers know where to build on strengths and focus their instructional support.

How is my student progressing over time?

The goal is for your student to be making progress in their learning. After your student has taken more than one Diagnostic in the school year, you will see results for each Diagnostic, which includes your student's progress overall and within each domain.

How can I support my student at home? Additional Suggestions

Celebrate your student's strengths and progress so they can feel motivated and ready to work on their goals. Contact your student's teacher for additional insight into their progress and to get resources that can support your student's learning at home.
