


In closing, thank you for continued support as we continue to work together at PHES.

MCAP State Standardized Testing

The month of April means it is time for state standardized testing to occur for students in Grades 3-5. Our intermediate students will participate in MCAP testing. The Maryland Comprehensive Assessment Program (MCAP) provides information to educators, families and the public on student progress towards proficiency on the Maryland state content standards. Dates of testing will be shared with families soon.

Alternate Assessment Testing

The month of April also means it is time for state standardized testing for students in Grades 3-5 who participate in the Alternate Academic Curriculum Classes (ACC). Alternate assessments were developed to ensure that all students, including students with significant cognitive disabilities, are able to participate in assessments that can measure what they know and can do in relation to the grade level standards. Dates of testing will be shared with families soon.

Daily attendance often plummets before and following Spring Break. As we prepare for warmer weather, please remember that allergies are not a reason to stay home from school. 
<u>Early Dismissal / Change in Dismissal</u> -- All Early Dismissals or Change in Dismissals must be done prior to 2:00 PM

<u>Late Arrival</u> -- Any arrival after school begins at 8:00 AM, is considered tardy. You must bring your student into office to sign them in.

<u>Absences</u> -- Absences can either be reported through the Parent Portal Account or a note can be sent in with the student when they return to school. Emails and phone calls are not accepted.

<u>Automated Attendance Calls</u> — When your child is late to school, or absent, you will receive the automated phone call stating that your child is absent. Updating attendance is a manual process done throughout the day and can take up to 24 + hours to be updated.

Are you moving soon? — If you are planning on moving soon, please notify the office via email with when your student's last day will be and where you will be moving to. This will ensure time to make sure an electronic transfer packet is created, as well as making sure items such as chromebooks and media books are returned to the school.

Instructional Focus for the Month of April:

Writing: Students will finish opinion writing and with the beginning of the 4th quarter, they will write what they would like to be when they grow up. By the third week in April, students will seque into narrative writing.

Science: We will dive into our Bubbleology Unit!

Explicit Comprehension: In reading, we will learn to compare and contrast books and characters as well as continue to practice retelling fiction and nonfiction books.

Foundations: We will learn and apply grade-level phonics and word skills when decoding words. FUNdations will focus on consonant blends.

Math: In earlier units, students developed strategies to add and subtract within 20 as they worked toward fluency with addition and subtraction facts. In unit 11 we will be using tools to add 2-digit numbers to subtract. They will also be subtracting multiples of 10. These skills prepare them for work next year with more difficult addition and subtraction problems.

WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

Math: Strategies to subtract 3 digit numbers

Reading: Fiction- Understanding the plot and structure of a story, determining the central message

Nonfiction- Understanding nonfiction text features, making connections between historical events, identifying author's main purpose

Writing: Opinion Writing- Students will continue to learn the difference between fact and opinion, as well as how to construct an opinion based argument through writing.

Science/Social Studies: We Are Time Travelers- Students will learn about historical sources, artifacts, and tools from the past.



Learning Focus

Reading: This month, we will be beginning to look at fairy tales by finding the theme, learning about characters, and how to look at the details of a text. We will also continue to practice responding to prompts and citing text evidence.

Writing: April begins 4th marking period, and a new writing focus. Students will learn about fairy tales, and how to write them.

Math: This month, we will be applying our knowledge of multiplication and division to solve two-step word problems. We will also be digging into our unit about perimeter.

Science: This month, students will begin an engineering project. Students will be learning about the steps of the Engineering Design Process. Then, they will identifying possible solutions to a problem, having to do with parachutes and drag.

Social Studies: Students will begin our quarter long Environmental Action Research project. We will start this project by learning about what a citizen is, how they help in the community, and by completing research to identify an environmental problem within our community.



IReady Reading Homework: 2 Lessons per week IReady Math Homework: 3 Lessons per week

WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

<u>Math:</u> The students have begun Unit 10 Multiply Fractions. Student will build their understanding of multiplying a fraction by a whole number and develop two processes for approaching the concept. We will be ending with Unit 10 CFA and begin Unit 11 Dividing Fractions. This lesson builds on earlier work with division and fractions to establish that a fraction describes an indicated division.

<u>Reading:</u> We will begin Theme 4: Creativity in IRA. Students can look forward to reading informational texts that inform about a wide range of topics. Students will use these texts to form questions and solve problems creatively!

<u>Writing:</u> Student are finishing up Unit 3 Writing of Literary Analysis and Opinion Writing. We will begin to learn the key features of Memoir Writing. Students will learn that content influences form and how to make decisions about the genre to best convey their content.

<u>Science</u>: We will be finishing up Q3 science with a CFA on how we can use data to prove that the weight of matter is conserved regardless of the type of change that occurs. For Quarter 4, students will be completing the engineering design process as they design and test water filter prototypes. They will then create a prototype to desalinate water. These engineering design challenges build on knowledge they learned in Unit 1.

<u>Social Studies</u>: Students will be starting the Challenges of American Economic, Political, and Civic Life. They will be from the 1900s till current. We will be exploring what were the educational opportunities for school age children in Anne Arundel County and how has the government evolved to expand the meaning of "We the People"?




