

Instructional Focus for the Month of January:

Writing: We will continue our informational unit through the end of the 2nd quarter with "How to" books. In the 3rd quarter, January 22nd, we will begin opinion writing.

Science: We will be exploring plant and animal Fraits and how traits connect living things.

Explicit Comprehension: In Reading, we will continue to read books related to the theme that Cultures Connect Us. Later, in Quarter 3, we will read stories related to the theme "Sending Messages." Students will practice describing the characters, setting, events, and lesson of the story in order to retell the story. Also, they will practice identifying text features in non-fiction books.

Foundations: We will learn and apply grade-level phonics and word skills when decoding words. FUNdations will focus on glues sounds an and am and then move onto suffixes.

Math: First grade will be wrapping up our unit on shapes to start off the New Year. We will then begin subtraction. Students will relate counting to subtraction. Then they use the strategies, count back, count on, make a 10, use addition, and fact families to subtract within 20. They will be testing unit 5 and 6 in January for math. They will also be iReady Math testing in January.

Please read with your child each evening and practice sight words.

Also, practice addition facts through 10. Flashcards will help improve fluency.

WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

Math: Adjusting Numbers to Subtract, Subtracting Fluently Within 20, Representing Subtraction with 2-Digit Numbers, Using a Numberline to Subtract

Reading: <u>Fiction</u>- Understanding the plot and structure of a story, identifying character traits.. <u>Nonfiction</u>- Formatting a friendly letter, responding to a prompt using RUNOVV, understanding key details.

Writing: Informational Writing-Students will write an informational book about a topic of their choosing.

Science/Social Studies: We Are Economists- Students will gain information about imports/ exports, wants vs. needs, scarcity, and geographical features.

Learning Focus

Reading: In reading we will continue our focus on responding to prompts and recounting major events. We will also be preparing for our Reading Quarterly Assessment. Beginning in the second quarter, we will begin looking at poetry.

Writing: We will be writing our country research reports. In the new marking period, we will be starting opinion writing.

Math: This month, in math, we will begin our unit about fractions! In this unit we will be exploring ways to represent fractions as well as compare fractions with the same numerator or denominator.

Science: During science we will learn about trait. After traits our next topic will be adaptations and habitat

Social Studies: In Social studies we will finish our country research project. Once the project is finished we will begin our unit on economics.

Reading: Nonfiction Focus

We are focusing on the following skills.

- Main Idea and Detail
- Using context Clues
- Supporting answers with evidence from the text.
- Making Inferences.

Writing:

We are working on using our animal research to write an informational writing piece.

Math:

We will be covering the following skills:

- Division within 10,000.
- Multi-step word problems using all four operations.
- Equivalent Fractions
- Adding and Subtracting fractions and mixed numbers.

Science:

We will be working on identifying types of weather, depositions and erosion.

Social Studies:

We will start learning about the types of people living in the british colony and events leading up to the American Revolution.

WHAT WE'RE LEARNING

Math: We are ending our Q2 testing over Unit 4, Unit 5, and Unit 6. We will be beginning Unit 7 Dividing whole numbers in the middle of January. Students will continue to use equations, rectangular arrays, and area models to extend their knowledge of division to include up to four-digit dividends and two-digit divisors.

Reading: Students will interact with multiple literary texts that enable them to compare and contrast the themes, settings, and plots of stories written by the same author about the same or similar characters. Students are exposed to informational texts that enable them to compare and contrast the most important points and key details presented in multiple texts on the same topics.

Writing: Write research-based informational reports within the discipline of history. Writers will conduct their own short research project to write an informational article on the topic.

Science: We are ending our unit on galaxy, stars and constellations. These lessons are focused on the motion of the Earth and how the constellations seem to move in the night sky over time. We will also be finishing with shadows and the apparent movement of the Sun in the sky, and how this affects the length of shadows.

Social Studies: We are ending our social studies unit with the transportations of Maryland and the enslaved people of Maryland. Key people we will be studying will be Harriet Tubman and Frederick Douglass and the impacts of the institution of slavery in North America and finally the conflict that led to the Civil War

Notes from the Office


Early Dismissal / Change in Dismissal -- All Early Dismissals or Change in Dismissals must be done prior to 2:00 PM




PHES Reading News



January is Read to a Friend Month

This month students will meet and read to their writing pen pals assigned in Dec. All students will begin the month by choosing a short story or book to read to their penpal. They will practice reading their chosen text to a classmate in preparation for our Read to a Friend Day. On Wed., January 24th, students in grades 3 - 5, will travel to the classrooms of their primary penpals. Each student will then read their short story or book to their student reading buddy.



What is Reading Comprehension?

Reading comprehension is a complicated process. It is the ultimate goal of all reading. It is defined as the ability to gain meaning from what has been read. Students must integrate new information they read with what they already know and later be able to recall what was read. Comprehension is dependent on students being able to decode words quickly and fluently. Students must also have an understanding of oral language, and word meanings.

Home Reading Tips to improve Reading Comprehension

- Hold conversations about what your child reads. Have your child summarize what was read. Ask probing "how/why" questions such as "What lesson can we learn from this?" (fiction text) or "What is the author trying to teach us?" (non-fiction text).
- Help your child go back into the text to find text evidence to support his or her answers to your questions ("How do you know this?").
- Begin comprehension questioning with a sentence, paragraph or short section of text to be sure that your child is understanding as the reading progresses.
- Discuss the meanings of unknown words that your child both reads and hears.
- Help your child to make connections to what is read with what has been read previously or with what he or she already knows

Our third through fifth graders will begin some self-reflection on their personal strengths and interests and discuss how important these factors

can be in selecting a career or future course of study. Parents can help their students start thinking this way by pointing out strengths that they see their children demonstrating.
