AACPS must take responsibility and action for dismantling, and actively repairing these inequities to ensure positive educational outcomes for all AACPS students."

As we move forward in closing out the end of this school year and draw closer to summer break, we must all remind our students to think before they post or speak, engage in empathetic conversations, find the good in others, and make choices that serve to productively and positively continue the dialogue. We must all commit to let our

words and actions serve as a broader exclamation that we will listen to each other, seek to understand, lift each other up, and be open-minded enough to truly be the change you wish to see in the world.
