Entrance into the School and School Security

Ridgeway Elementary School is equipped with a video camera system. It covers selected interior and exterior public portions of the building and grounds. It is NOT monitored constantly, but it is monitored during emergency situations. During certain events, when the safety or security of students may be in question, authorized personnel from local, state, or federal police or fire emergency units may be given access to view images projected on the camera system. If you have any questions about the system, you should call the Supervisor of School Security at 410-222-5083.

Anne Arundel County Policy requires all parents and visitors to enter through the main entrance (the entrance with Ridgeway Elementary School signage) at all times and check in at the Main Office. You will need to ring the bell located at the left side/front door and present your photo ID. A school staff member will signal for you to enter the building. You MUST report to the Main Office.

What's Happening at Ridgeway in December.....

ACC 1 & ACC 2

Our theme this month revolves around holiday traditions. Our students explore different cultures and customs through pen pals. The core content stories are: Writing to Pen Pals, Holiday Pen Pals Around the World, What is a Pen Pal? and Using a Map. For written expression, we will be working on using high frequency words and our themed vocabulary. Students will learn how to form/build/read sentences addressing who, what, and where while retaining comprehension of these new vocabulary words.

Dolch/Fry Words- are, can, her, do, about, like, dear, family, learn, live, tell, too, letter, write, your, ask, them, their

Vocabulary- celebrate, country, culture, different, family, friend, holiday, letter, location, map, pen pal, tradition

In math, we will be taking survey data about what our favorite holiday activities around the world. Students will analyze their graph to answer questions related to the survey answers. Students will also continue to work on individualized skills such as adding, subtracting, multiplying, dividing, measuring, rounding, telling time, counting coins, and solving word problems related to our holiday theme.

During our Science and S.S block students will be using the scientific method to conduct an experiment using glow sticks. We will practice measurement/ sequencing skills to create delicious winter themed recipes. We will also cover unit 4 literature based social skills lessons revolving around basic interactions such sharing, personal space, and being yourself.

Literature Based Stories Include: Llama Llama Time to Share, Spaghetti in a Hot Dog Bun, I Like Myself, and No Means No. Supplemental Social Stories & Activities Include: Howie Helps Himself, Uniquely Wired, and My Friend Isabelle

Kindergarten

Our upcoming unit is all about how things move. In Math, we will be exploring shapes and their attributes and nonstandard measurement. In Language Arts, we will continue to work on sight words, letters/sounds, blending to read words and reading strategies. Before break, we will explore how winter holidays are celebrated around the world. We look forward to activities that will bring this calendar year to a close. Due to the change of weather, please send in a temperature appropriate change of clothes to store in your child's locker and make sure they are bringing a coat.

First

We hope that your child has been enjoying Chessie! Please encourage your child to read and participate to earn their prizes. Your child should read every night, even if they are not participating in Chessie. There are always strategies and skills to practice, from sounding out new words to using an expressive voice.

Please encourage your child to practice addition and subtraction facts at home, as

well as take time to practice writing complete sentences.

Weather reminder: We will be going outside for recess as long as it is above freezing temperatures. Please send your child to school with a jacket or coat. ©

Second

In Language Arts, we will be using information gained from illustrations and words to show understanding of characters, setting, and plot; describing how characters respond to major events and challenges in a story; and determining the meaning of words. We will be learning how to write informational text such as a lab report. Additionally, students will learn and apply grade-level phonics and word analysis skills in decoding words.

In Math, we are learning how to represent three-digit numbers in word form and expanded form. We will also be comparing numbers using place value and skip counting.

In Science and Social Studies, we are learning what it means to be a digital native. We will also be learning about scientists and what scientists do, including how to use the scientific method.

Please have your child wear his or her coat to school in case we can have outdoor recess. We hope that everyone had a wonderful Thanksgiving Break, and we look forward to having lots of fun educational experiences for the rest of 2019!

Third

In Language Arts, students will be practicing comprehension skills such as author's purpose, point of view, main idea and details and making inferences. Our math will cover multiplication, division, measurement and fractions. Please keep practicing multiplication facts with your child each day to help them become fluent in their basic facts. In Social Studies, students are studying communities and culture. In Science, students will learn about the life cycle of living things.

Fourth

<u>Fifth</u>

In Language Arts, students are finishing their unit on Communication. Our next unit will be Collaboration. In Writing, students are working on writing narrative text from someone else's point of view. We will also touch on poetry and figurative language. Throughout the next marking period, we will be covering operations with fractions and volume in Math. Stars will be the focus for Science in the second quarter. Social Studies will be focusing on the events leading to the American Revolution.

Cultural Arts

Fifth grade will create a poster design using the elements and principles of art. Their poster will have a positive message to help bring about change in our world. Fourth grade will design a zentangle inspired coral reef sea creature. In groups, they will write a play about saving the coral reefs and perform it for the class. Third grade will use construction paper to create sea animal totem poles. They will also make a clay seahorse. Second grade will look at the various ways that artists show weather in their art. They will create two different artworks inspired by what they learn. First grade will work together to create a game inspired by baby shark and the shark family. They will have to problem solve and use only the materials that they are given. Kindergarten will learn about houses and architecture and create a neighborhood of houses around a lake.

Media

Chessie reading club is in full swing in our Media Center. Thank you to our students and volunteers for participating! Computer Science Education Week occurs in December and our students are participating in the Hour of Code. We are also working on other STEM and literacy projects in Media. Thank you for continuing to make reading a priority for our children!

Physical Education

As we finish up Fitness testing the students will be finishing out the calendar year playing a couple staples here at Ridgeway. The focus will be on hand eye control, balance, and throwing accuracy in our first game of "Santa's little helpers" as we try to gather toys for the holidays. Next, we will be working on muscular endurance and teamwork as they play an all-time favorite in "The Grinch." This game was created from Dr Seuss's book of How the Grinch Stole Christmas.

Music

General Music students are continuing their work with the steady beat, rhythm, notation, singing, and form among many other things.

Head Lice

A Real Head Scratcher For Parents

Pediculosis, or head lice, is a condition that affects approximately 6-12 million children between the ages of 3 and 12 years of age, and about one in every 100 elementary students every year.

Head lice are parasites that are generally found on the scalp, around the ears, and at the back of the neck. The adult louse is about the size of a sesame seed, and can be a reddish brown color. Eggs, or nits, are smaller and silver in color.

Head lice are not a sign of poor hygiene and they do not transmit disease. The most common symptom of head lice is head scratching, particularly at night. If you suspect your child has head lice, have them examined by your health care provider and follow their directions.

Anne Arundel county Public Schools has a No Live Lice Policy in keeping with the recommendations of the American Academy of Pediatrics and the National Association of School Nurses.

When a student is found to have live lice or nits less than ¼ inch from the scalp, the parent will be notified. The student can remain in school until the end of the day and must be treated by an over-the-counter or prescription insecticide shampoo before returning to school.

These shampoos should kill the live lice, but may not kill all the nits. You may need to treat again in 7-10 days.

How to get your child back to school:

- Your child must be free of live lice and all nits close to the scalp (within ¼ inch from scalp).
 - Your child must be checked by school health staff before returning to class.
