Should you have more than two children, please utilize a second form that you can either obtain from the school or download from the AACPS website at www.aacps.org/students. Also, please note that the complete address of the Parent/Guardian's Employer if they work on Federal Property, the complete address of the Federal Property on which they work, and each survey form must be signed and dated by the Parent/Guardian. We will also be using our Connect-Ed Automated Telephone Notification System to remind everyone about the significance of completing and returning this survey. The school system receives approximately \$2 million in funding from the Federal government in support of our children after the forms are processed.

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Entrance into the School and School Security

Ridgeway Elementary School is equipped with a video camera system. It covers selected interior and exterior public portions of the building and grounds. It is NOT monitored constantly, but it is monitored during emergency situations. During certain events, when the safety or security of students may be in question, authorized personnel from local, state, or federal police or fire emergency units may be given access to view images projected on the camera system. If you have any questions about the system, you should call the Supervisor of School Security at 410-222-5083.

Anne Arundel County Policy requires all parents and visitors to enter through the main entrance (the entrance with Ridgeway Elementary School signage) at all times and check in at the Main Office. You will need to ring the bell located at the left side/front door and present your photo ID. A school staff member will signal for you to enter the building. You MUST report to the Main Office

- 6. Speak to the school nurse if you need to obtain information about health insurance for your child.



WHAT'S HAPPENING AT RIDGEWAY?

ACC I AND II -

Our theme this month revolves around knowing and apply the scientific method to have our own science fair. We will explore how to form a hypothesis, conduct an experiment, collect data, analyze results, and interpret outcomes through leveled readers. Our core content stories are: Will it Stick, Science Fair Day, Using the Scientific Method, and How to Make A Science Fair Project.

For written expression, we will be working on using high frequency words and our themed vocabulary. Students will learn how to form/build/read sentences addressing who, what, and where while retaining comprehension of these new vocabulary words.

(**Dolch/Fry Words**- it, on, put, will, do water, the did, write, your show, good, had, world, learn, time which, next

Vocabulary- chart, conclusion, data, experiment, guess, organize, poster, project, question, science fair, scientific method, and scientist.

In math, we will be exploring pick up clip fractions by matching visual representations and building/writing them respectively. Students will also continue to work on individualized skills such as adding, subtracting, multiplying, dividing, measuring, rounding, telling time, counting coins, and solving word problems related to our science fair theme.

During our Science and S.S block students will be using the scientific method in practice by performing experiment and collecting data. We will practice measurement/ sequencing skills to create delicious fall themed recipes. We will also cover unit 2 literature based social skills lessons revolving around EMPATHY and FEELINGS.

(**Literature Based Stories Include**: The Way I Feel, Glad monster Sad Monster, Little Big Feelings, and I am Human.

Supplemental Social Stories Include: How I Can Calm, Coping Wheel, Behaviors That hurt, and I Feel

KINDERGARTEN We have gotten off to a fun start in **Kindergarten**! Homework will be starting the second week of October. Thanks to our PTA, Kindergarten received agenda books. Homework will be glued in their agenda books every Monday but completed in pencil in their Homework composition book. In language arts this month we will introduce sight words, identify beginning sounds in words, recognize rhyming words, and practice blending sounds into words. In math we will work on shapes, counting 0-10 and identifying "How many?" in a group. Science and Social Studies incorporates social skills, fire safety, the season of Fall and how to be a good friend. Our Field Trip is October 23rd to Downs Park for Trees are Terrific.

FIRST – The first graders have done a great job of getting back into the school routine! They have enjoyed learning about the Monarch caterpillars and butterflies through shared readings, science lessons, and interactive read-alouds. We will be beginning our next unit, Our Natural World Changes, very soon. It includes the sun, weather, seasons, and different holidays.

In Math, the children will continue to learn and use math strategies to add and subtract to 20. The children should continue to become fluent on their facts to 10.

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THIRD - We're off to a great start in third grade! Students are continuing to practice reading skills such as sequencing, drawing conclusions, and identifying main idea and details. In math, we are working on multiplication and division. Please help your child practice their basic multiplication facts at home for quickness and accuracy. Students will continue their study of map skills and begin a study of Anne Arundel County. In Science, students will be studying forces of motion.

FOURTH= In fourth grade Language Arts, we are continuing to work on analyzing characters. We will also be exploring the theme of various texts. We are continuing with narrative writing. In Science, we will explore animal structures. In Social Studies, we will continue to learn about various explorers and their travels. Students will be working on factors and multiples in Math. They will also identify numbers as prime or composite. Thank you for a successful start to the school year!

FIFTH – The first full month has really flown by for our fifth graders! Please make sure that your child is completing daily homework, practicing math facts, and reading each night. Our themes in Language Arts are Communication and Taking a Stand. In Math, we will continue to multiply and divide larger numbers and begin adding and subtracting fractions. We will continue our discussions of colonization in Social Studies. Ecosystems and food webs will be our focus in Science later this month.

CULTURAL ARTS -

ART - 5th grade artists will design an ice sculpture on paper and paint it using metallic watercolor paint. 4th grade artists will create their own myth inspired by the body of water that they identify with the most. They will write their myth using symbolism and metaphor and illustrate it with a watercolor painting. Third grade artists will pick a body of water that they most identify with and create a symbol for it. They will make a print of the symbol, illustrate that body of water and write poem about it. 2nd grade artists will design their own version of a submarine after being inspired by the Beatle's Yellow Submarine.

First grade will create a funny falling leaves painting using a wax resist technique. Kindergarten artists will create an action portrait of themselves inspired by the artists Keith Haring.

MEDIA = Ridgeway's book fair was a success. Thank you for everyone who volunteered, we appreciate your dedication. We look forward to having another one in the spring. Remember we will start Chessie this month. Second through 5th grade will start Chessie on Monday, October 21st and 1st grade will start on October 28th. We hope to have everyone from 1st grade through 5th grade participate this year. Thank you for making reading a priority for our children!

MUSIC- We are pleased to welcome back Mrs. Lopata as out part time General Music teacher again this year after her maternity leave last spring. We are also excited to have Mr. Wertz joining our General Music staff this year and Ms. Westermeyer as our new band teacher. Mr. Bosch is only teaching strings this year because of the growth in the instrumental program under his direction and Mr. Fisher has returned for General Music and Chorus full time.

As of this writing, interested students have chosen instruments to play and joined chorus. Preparation has begun in earnest for the Winter concerts. General Music classes have been learning about rhythms, tone color, and melodic contour among many other things and 5th grade General Music students have completed their first project of the year by creating a musical autobiography and performing it. The year looks exciting and full of wonder as the train leaves the station heading toward our new destination in June 2020. Look for concert dates to come home soon.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION – October is an exciting month for us in the Gym. 5th graders will be working on their dance unit and learn to dance the "Thriller". The younger students will be playing Halloween themed games working on teamwork, throwing, and catching skills. Halloween stations will round out the month for everyone as we work on a variety of different skills from hand eye coordination, throwing accuracy, volleying, striking, and catching stations.



October is National Bully Prevention Month! Please join me in wearing orange on October 23rd to spread awareness. Our goal is to create and enhance mindsets of kindness, acceptance, and inclusion that will carry far beyond the walls of our school. School counseling lessons will be focused on anti-bullying practices. I look forward to being in each classroom to have this important discussion.

We will also be collecting nonperishable items for Harvest for the Hungry food drive. Be on the lookout for a spirit week flyer to make the giving a little more fun. Feel free to drop off items at your convenience. Please bring canned goods and boxed items. The Anne Arundel County Food Bank is asking that students not to bring in any glass items.

I'm so proud of our Character trait of the month winners! During the month of October, we will be looking for the character trait of responsibility. This looks like doing the right thing even when no one is watching! Encourage your students to be in control of their own behavior. We're looking for students who can be trusted with important jobs.
