Math Resources

Students will continue to work on numerals and amounts to 10. Just a reminder that it is completely normal for students to write numbers backwards at this time. Please continue to demonstrate the proper way of writing numbers but place greater focus on connecting the amounts to the correct numeral and counting accurately. The other major skill that students will be focusing on this month is identifying multiple ways to make a given amount. (ex. 4 and 3 make 7, 5 and 2 make 7 and so on) This skill is a precursor to addition. In developing this skill, it is important to use manipulatives. The red and yellow counters in the school supply backpack are perfect manipulatives to use.

Online Games Fuzz Bugs Number Bonds on www.abcya.com is a great game to help practice number bonds. In this game, students can select a number to make. Then they must catch a fuzz bug with the amount needed to complete the number bond at the bottom of the screen. This game is fun however, students need to have a solid knowledge of numerals and the value they represent to play the game. Also, another great online resource is iReady. Students can access the program through the Classlink portal at any time. IReady is tailored to your student's individual needs.

These family card games will better support students that require a visual to count to discover ways to make a given amount.

Make An Amount 2 to 4 players

How to play: Split deck evenly between all players. The players cannot look at their cards. Select an amount to make between 5-10, this is the target number. After the number is selected, players may begin to turn over cards; two cards at a time. Once cards are out, the player must add the cards together (face cards are equal to 0). Which ever player makes the target number first wins. If their amount is too high or too low the player can set aside both cards or they may keep one. The players then continue to flip cards out until someone makes the target number. Players can only have two cards in play. So, if a player chooses to keep a card they can only turn out one card at a time. Whoever wins that round selects the next amount but they cannot select the amount that was just made.



Twas the night before Christmas and all through the house all the wildcats were reading all snug in their beds...

Did you know that reading aloud to children and a child's time spent reading books are some of the most powerful tools to help build great readers and overall educational success? With the current screen time overload, it is important to balance technology with actual books in hand and this includes taking advantage of the benefits and pure joy that an effective read aloud story can provide. Read on for some great tips and *enjoy*!

- Let the Child Pick the Book This is an excellent way to get your child involved in the reading aloud process.
- Don't Be Afraid of Wordless Picture Books! They provide a great opportunity for your child to analyze picture clues, develop vocabulary and oral language, make predictions, and answer comprehension questions like What do you think is happening here?
 Start Small The younger the child the shorter the attention span. Gradu-
- Start Small The younger the child the shorter the attention span. Gradually select longer stories when your child seems ready for them. Stopping mid-book and using a bookmark is okay, too.
- **Be Creative With Your Voice** Use different voices for different characters and unleash your inner drama king or queen! Have fun with the sound effects, too.
- Read It Again This can help develop language skills and improve reading comprehension.
- Read Aloud to Big Kids, Too In *The Read-Aloud Handbook*, Jim Trelease says "...kids usually listen on a higher level than they read."
- **Explain Some New Words** Listening comprehension develops first and then supports speaking, reading, and writing vocabulary.
